President's Message



The definition of Tradition is a belief or behavior passed down within a group or society with symbolic meaning or special significance with origins in the past. The word tradition comes from the Latin verb tradere which means to transmit, to hand over, to give for safekeeping. Sometimes tradition can include socially meaningful clothing and is often found in traditional music, dance, and athletic games. Traditions are thought to be ancient and deeply important to a group or society and transmitted through time; taught by one generation to the next. It is said that it takes two transmissions to happen over three generations for a practice, belief, or object to be considered traditional.

I have found over the years that tradition is extremely important to me and is rooted with pride and emotion. Today, I have four generations of family participating and celebrating: from my Mum to myself and sisters, to my children and grandchildren. While we are proud Americans, we are also proud Scots; always anchored by our Scottish traditions. My parents passed this to me, and I passed them to my children and today marks the first Highland Games for my Grandson and Granddaughter. To this day, the pipes and drums give me “all the feels” as they say, dancers bring a tear to my eye and joy to my heart, and I sit in awe of the athletes. I often think about where I come from, the trials and tribulations of my ancestors and the deep meaning of our traditions. And that makes the honor of being trusted with the transmission and safekeeping of the Tacoma Highland Games incredibly special to me.

Today, I welcome you as we don our kilts and ghillies; our emotions stirred by the sound of pipes and drums, the grace of highland dancers and the strength of athletes reminding us of our strong Celtic traditions. We visit the clans to discover our heritage and ancestry. We visit the shops to find the treasure to take home and remind us of the wonderful day we had celebrating Scotland!

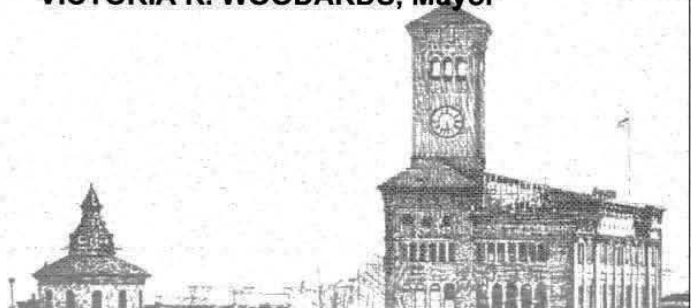

Dance Piper Richard Brown



Richard has been piping for 48 years. Originally from Saint John, New Brunswick, he played in the winning 1983 Grade 3 North American Pipe Band Championships with the Jervis Bay Memorial Pipe Band. He joined the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band Organization upon moving to Vancouver, BC in 1988. Richard was a BC Piper's Knockouts Finalist in 1995. In 1995, he won the 1995 Grade 1 World Pipe Band Championships with the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band. Richard serves as the Honorary Civilian Piper for Canada's World War 2 Veterans 50th and 60th Anniversary Liberation of Holland Ceremonies. He began playing for highland dancing in 2009 around British Columbia, Alberta, and Washington State.

Piping & Drumming Judges



Jeff Brewer: A published composer of pipe music, Jeff has enjoyed playing with many pipe bands, including Blue Heron Bay, City of Seattle, Clan Macleay, Willamette Valley, Abbotsford Police, and Columbia Regional, serving as Pipe Major with both Clan Macleay and Willamette Valley. He has studied with some of North America's and Scotland's most respected players. Jeff is a well-known bagpipe instructor and clinician, teaching both individuals and pipe bands. Jeff was a co-founder and chief piping instructor of the Sir James McDonald Pipe Band, a youth band which enjoyed success in competitions in North America and Scotland. He instructed for many years at the Coeur d'Alene Summer School of Piping at North Idaho College. Jeff was co-founder and president of Highland Musical Arts, which for many years ran a summer school for piping and drumming. Most

important to Jeff, he has enjoyed seeing his students compete successfully at the highest levels of solo competition.



Keith Paton: Keith is a native of Kansas City and grew up playing in the Kansas City St. Andrew Pipe Band. Since moving to Seattle in 1994, Keith has been active in the Pacific Northwest piping community. From 1997 to 1999 he played with the Grade 1 Abbotsford Police Pipe Band. In 2000, he joined the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band playing with SFU from 2000 to 2006, and then again from 2010 to 2014. Keith is an approved adjudicator with the British Columbia Pipers' Association where he served on the BCPA grading committee for several years. He has taught at

numerous piping schools including Piping Hot, Highland Musical Arts, and the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival and has taught privately and worked with pipe bands for over 30 years. Since retiring from his "real job" as a faculty member at Highline College in Des Moines, Washington, Keith has expanded his piping instruction opportunities. Piping & Drumming Judges



Micah Babinski: Micah is an experienced and versatile piper, whistle player, and mandolinist. He began his piping career in Oakland, CA under the instruction of Scottish piper and drummer Liza MacAdam. Micah has extensive competitive piping experience, winning or placing highly at the top levels of solo playing in the Pacific Northwest, California, and New York. Micah has played in several successful bagpipe bands, including Prince Charles Pipe Band of San Francisco, Simon Fraser University Pipe Band, and Dowco Triumph Street Pipe Bands. He has also performed in ensembles alongside guitar-driven rock groups, Renaissance Faire band Tartanic, Taiko drummers, and a Balanese Gamelan. His Celtic folk band, Dram & Go, has performed throughout the Pacific Northwest at pubs and festivals since 2014. In addition to performing Micah is a published bagpipe composer. Several of

Micah's compositions have been featured on albums by Dram & Go, Tartanic, solo bagpipers, and top level bagpipe bands. Micah lives in Portland, OR and works in computer security.



Rob McKendrick is a professional drummer/percussionist, composer/arranger, instructor and clinician. A native of Portland, Oregon, he holds a performance degree from Portland State University and is a graduate of Percussion Institute of Technology in Hollywood, California where he received the Remo award as outstanding student and received tuition from Joe Porcaro (L.A. studio legend), Jeff Porcaro (Toto, L.A. studio), Ralph Humphrey (Don Ellis, Frank Zappa, L.A. studio), Efrain Toro (Stan Getz, George Benson, Chicago), Casey Scheurell (Robben Ford), Takashi Numazawa (Chaka Kahn), Chuck Flores (Woody Herman) and Dave Garibaldi (Tower of Power). Rob has worked with the Lawrence Welk Orchestra, Les Brown's Band of Renown, Gino Vanelli, The

Oregon Symphony, The Oregon Symphonic Band, Ed Ames and Carol Lawrence in 'The Great American Songbook', slide guitarist Dennis Johnson, groundbreaking Celtic fusion band Full Shilling, as well as many Portland area jazz musicians. He has written and produced music for Radiation, Creatures Of Habit, Strictly Time I and II, Network, and Kolotov Mocktails. Rob started pipe band drumming with the Portland Grays Boys Pipe Band at age 7, was lead drummer for the Blue Heron Bay Pipe Band and the Seattle Pipe Band and was a long-time member of the City Of Victoria Pipe Band. He has judged and conducted clinics all over the world.

Athletics

Scottish field events have been a part of the Highland games for centuries. Some say that the events derive from tests of skill used by Clan chiefs to select the strongest warriors to lead the Clansmen into battle. Others believe that these competitions were organized to control brawling and to arouse each rival by displaying strength and skill.

Stone Toss Each competitor must stand firmly planted and push a large rock through the air. Competitors are not permitted to complete any running or spinning to assist the throw.

Hammer Toss Two types of hammers are used – 16 and 22 pounds. Competitors stand, backs to the field, and swing the hammer several times above the head to pick up momentum. The competitor must release the hammer to let it fly straight behind, over the treag. The throw is measured for distance.

Weight for Distance Two standard weights for this event include a 28 and 56 pound weight. The competitor takes a running start, spins to gain momentum, and tosses the weight before it throws him over the treag. The throw is measured for distance.

Weight for Height In this event the competitor swings the weight over head and tosses it over a bar higher than any other competitor. Each competitor gets three tries. The bar is raised an inch at a time until a winner is declared.

The Caber Toss A caber is a large straight pole, usually 15-18 feet long and weighing 90-120 lbs. A competitor has to balance the caber against his arms and shoulder, lift it, and quickly cup the narrow end in the hands. Then the run or walk begins to build momentum in the top end. At just the right moment, he plants his feet, pushes the pole forward with the shoulders and lifts the end up and over. The perfect throw is when the caber falls in a perfectly straight imaginary line from the competitor's feet, through the pole, in a 12 o'clock position.

Orms Viking Kindred of the NW Viking Festival

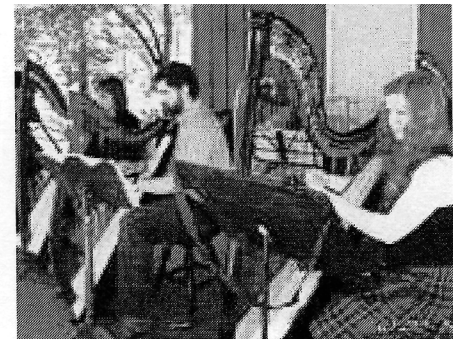
